Jasprit Bumrah's Fiery Send-Off, Ice-Cold Stare On Last Ball To Sam Konstas: Drama Unfolds On IND vs AUS Day 1

Bumrah and Sam Konstas were involved in a fierce staredown after the pacer dismissed Usman Khawaja on the final ball of Day 1. What was also noticeable was how the incident pumped up the entire Indian team, even as Bumrah and Konstas were involved in the tense exchange.

It all happened when Konstas and Bumrah had a go at each other in the second last ball of the day, with the 19-year-old Australian in no mood to back off. But it culminated with the Indian captain dismissing the southpaw, followed by a chilling stare directed at



Konstas, leaving no doubt about the intensity of the contest.

The Indian team also rallied around their newly named skipper, and the picture was equally telling. Konstas was walking off quietly towards the dressing room, and almost all the 11 Indian fielders were

celebrating in his ears.

Meanwhile, Australia reached 9/1 at stumps after bowling out India for 185 on the opening day of the fifth and final Test.

India, who recovered from 57/3 to 107/4 at tea, lost the remaining six wickets for 78

runs in the final session.

Rishabh Pant (40 off 98) top-scored for India, while Scott Boland (4/31) was the pick of the Australia bowlers.

In response, Australia ended the day at nine for one as Jasprit Bumrah removed Usman Khawaja off the last ball of the day.

India captain Rohit Sharma rested himself from the series finale with Bumrah walking out for the toss in his place.

India trail the series 1-2. Brief scores: India all out 185 in 72.2 overs (Rishabh Pant 40, Shubman Gill 20; Scott Boland 4/31). Australia 9/1 in 3 overs (Sam Konstas 7 not out; Jasprit Bumrah 1/7).

Novak Djokovic Thumps Gael Monfils To Reach Brisbane International Quarter-final

Novak Djokovic's bid for a 100th ATP Tour title gained momentum on Thursday as the Serb thumped fellow veteran Gael Monfils 6-3 6-3 to reach the Brisbane International quarter-finals. The 37-year-old, who is looking to join Roger Federer (103) and Jimmy Connors (109) as players who have won at least a century of titles, breezed through the first set on the back of a solitary break in the fourth game. Djokovic never looked back from there as he powered through the second set to extend his win-loss record against the French player to 20-0, nearly two decades after their first encounter in the opening round of the 2005 U.S. Open. "We've been playing for many years," said Djokovic, who will be gunning for an 11th Australian

Open title when the season's opening Grand Slam begins later this month. "I've known Gael since I was 15. We played quite a bit at juniors and on Tour and have had a good score against him but we have had some incredible battles. He's one of the best, if not the best, athlete in our sport over the years." Djokovic will step up his preparations for a tilt at a 25th Grand Slam title at the Jan. 12-26 Australian

Open when he takes on big-serving American Reilly Opelka in the next round. Opelka got past Matteo Arnaldi 7-6(9) 7-6(4) while Frenchman Giovanni Mpetshi Perricard, another player who can blow away his opponents with booming serves, upset fourth seed Frances Tiafoe 6-4 7-6(4).

Rohit Sharma's Test Career Over? Selectors Inform Him In Sydney, Discussions With Virat Kohli As Well: Report

NEW DELHI : Rohit Sharma has reportedly been told by the Indian selectors about their vision the 38-year-old does not fit in the scheme of things. Rohit, who opted to rest in the Sydney Test against Australia, has been under the scanner for his recent performances, and his future as the Indian Test captain seems to be in serious doubt. His struggles with the bat in the ongoing Border-Gavaskar Trophy raised question marks over his position in the playing XI. Therefore, the selectors have reportedly decided to move past him after consulting head coach Gautam Gambhir and chairman of selectors Ajit

this before the Sydney Test. The report, published by theindianexpress.com

suggests that the Indian Test team is preparing for a significant transition.

The selectors are also set to meet Virat Kohli after the series to discuss the future course of action. All-rounder Ravindra Jadeja will also be included in it but will be a part of the squad in the transitional phase.

Meanwhile, former India legend Sunil Gavaskar spoke about Rohit's situation and said, "I think it probably means that (if) India doesn't qualify for the WTC final, the Melbourne Test will be Rohit Sharma's last game. The (next) WTC cycle will start with the England series, and the selectors would likely

want someone available for the 2027 final. Whether India gets there or not is another matter, but that's what the selection committee is likely to do. We have probably seen Rohit Sharma for the last time in Test cricket."

However, former India head coach Ravi Shastri said, "If there was a home season coming up he might've thought of carrying on, but I think he might just pull the plug at the end of this Test," he said on commentary. "He's not getting younger ... it's not that India don't have youngsters. There are very, very good players in the wings and it's time to build. Tough decisions, but there is a

claimed his second wicket with a well-directed delivery that found Kohli's outside edge. The ball flew toward second slip, where Steve Smith dived to his right, scooping it toward Marnus Labuschagne at gully.

However, replays revealed the ball had brushed the ground after rolling off Smith's fingers—a detail spotted by TV umpire Joel Wilson, who ruled Kohli not out.

The Indian dressing room watched the drama unfold on the big screen, with Rohit Sharma, who had been excluded from the playing XI, visibly tense.

Once the decision came through in Kohli's favour, Rohit finally sat back, appearing more at ease.

Jasprit Bumrah Clashes With Umpire After Washington Sundar's Debatable Dismissal, Simon Taufel Defends Call

NEW DELHI : India captain Jasprit Bumrah was left unimpressed with the umpiring on Day 1 of the fifth India-Australia Test on Friday after teammate Washington Sundar was dismissed in a controversial manner off Pat Cummins. The incident occurred in the 67th over when Sundar attempted to pull a short one from the Australian captain but could not connect. While the ball sailed through to wicketkeeper Alex Carey, the Aussies immediately went up in loud appeal. When turned down, they opted for a DRS review. Third umpire Joel Wilson took some time examining the replays - The Snickometer showed a spike when the ball was close to the gloves. But interestingly, while in one frame of the replay, there was no spike when the ball was nearest to



the glove, the subsequent frame captured a spike on the Snickometer. Strangely, without conclusive evidence to overturn the on-field umpire's decision, Wilson deemed Washington out. "Last game he didn't give it out on snicko and now this give out," an unhappy Bumrah was heard saying after the verdict. "I'm sorry, but that's a crap decision! Sure, there was a spike, but from the side angle, there was a clear space

between the ball and the glove. There is a lot of ambiguity with these kinds of decisions. The benefit must go to the batter," said Former India batter Robin Uthappa. Former England captain Michael Vaughan also expressed his shock at Wilson's decision and called it "awful." However, Simon Taufel, the legendary ex-umpire, who is regarded as one of cricket's most respected voices, defended Wilson's call. "What Joel Wilson's looking for here is that spike up to one frame past the glove, and he's got that spike. There's nothing else out there, and the ball is underneath the glove. The third umpire is well and truly within his rights, according to the protocols, to determine that's conclusive evidence for ball on glove," Taufel explained on Channel 7.
